

Another memorable annual meeting



LITERALLY AND FIGURATIVELY, the dust has settled on the two biggest events on the Blue Ridge Electric Cooperative calendar. The cooperative's annual meeting of members and our charity fund-raiser, Blue Ridge Fest, took place with just eight days separating

them in late April-early May. I'm pleased to report that both of these undertakings were very successful.

The attendance at our 78th annual meeting on April 26 was estimated to be about 5,000. In all, more than 2,700 members were registered. It was a very good turnout in view of the rain that fell for much of that evening. Fortunately, the cooperative's Pickens equipment facility is well-suited to accommodate rainy weather and keep everyone in the dry.

We've always designed our annual meetings to be both educational and enjoyable. The business meeting is sandwiched between other activities, such as musical entertainment and prize drawings.

An emphasis on patriotism

There's also an emphasis on patriotism. At the start of the business session, the Pledge of Allegiance was recited, preceded by a unique and elaborate flag-raising by a team of Blue Ridge linemen. This was followed with a solo rendition of our National Anthem. Later in the program, we recognized all the military veterans and current members of our armed forces who were present.

In addition to introducing all the elected officials and other candidates for office in attendance, I had the opportunity to share a short

management report with the members. My remarks were devoted primarily to the ongoing maintenance and system-improvement activities that are under way on the cooperative's 7,000-mile system of power lines. I emphasized that our enduring aim is to keep raising service reliability for our members to an ever-higher level.


The other item of business on the agenda was the election of co-op directors. In a contested race featuring the use of paper ballots, incumbent Pickens County board member Frank Looper defeated challenger Jason Dennis. Mendel Stone of Oconee County and Pickens County's Jimmy Lee Dodgens ran unopposed and were reelected by acclamation. Congratulations to all these gentlemen.




Summer Energy-Saving Tips
